This marks a new beginning for Public Safety in the Town of Berlin. On February 1, 2016 the Berlin Fire and Berlin Rescue Departments were legally combined into one entity. Under the guidance of the new Fire & EMS Chief Paul J. Zbikowski the group has gone through a tremendous transformation. The department now has 43 paid-on-call firefighting and emergency medical personnel and 11 volunteer members of the newly formed Community Emergency Response Team.

WHAT'S SO GOOD ABOUT GROWING OLD

Even as certain mental skills decline with age—what was that guy's name again?—scientists are finding the mind gets sharper at a number of vitally important abilities. In a University of Illinois study, older air traffic controllers excelled at their cognitively taxing jobs, despite some losses in short-term memory and visual spatial processing. How so? They were expert at navigating, juggling multiple aircraft simultaneously and avoiding collisions.

People also learn how to deal with social conflicts more effectively. For a 2010 study, researchers at the University of Michigan presented "Dear Abby" letters to 200 people and asked what advice they would give. Subjects in their 60s were better than younger ones at imagining different points of view, thinking of multiple resolutions and suggesting compromises.

It turns out that managing emotions is a skill, one that takes many of us decades to master. In a published study, German researchers had people play a gambling game meant to induce regret. Unlike 20-somethings, those in their 60s didn't agonize over losing, and they were less likely to try to redeem their loss by later taking big risks.

These social skills may bring huge benefits. In 2010, researchers at Stony Brook University analyzed a telephone survey of hundreds of thousands of Americans and found that people over 50 were happier overall, with anger declining steadily from the 20s through the 70s and stress falling off a cliff in the 50s.

Tax Savings Tips

Seniors, 70 years and older, can apply for Elderly Tax Exemptions under Clause 41. A tax exemption releases an individual from the requirement to pay all or part of taxes assessed for his/her real property. Clause 41 can provide a deduction of \$500 from the year's tax bill. "ARE YOU OK?" TELEPHONE REASSURANCE PROGRAM

Are you OK? was born as a result of a public service project developed by Bruce Johnson for the Osage Police Department in Osage, Iowa. After going on line in 1988 in Osage, the RUOK project issued alerts to the police department and response teams saving the lives of many senior citizens.

Due to this success, other communities started inquiring about the RUOK. Currently there are over 2000 RUOK systems throughout North America.

The NASHOBA VALLEY REGION-AL DISPATCH DISTRICT, including the towns of Berlin, Bolton, Devens, Fort Devens, Harvard, Lancaster and Lunenburg, currently offers RUOK to seniors interested in this wellbeing check.

The system consists of a personal computer system, telephone, printer and the Are You OK? Software operated out of the NASHOBA VALLEY REGIONAL DISPATCH DISTRICT in Devens. Subscriber names, phone numbers and call times are stored in the system. RUOK automatically calls each person at a predetermined time. If the subscriber does not respond within a specified amount of time, an alert is given and the contact person is notified.

If needed, emergency personnel would be dispatched to the person's home to check on them.

If the person will not be at home, the Dispatch Center can be notified by calling 978-772-1900 to inform them that a phone call will not be needed that day.

Applicants must be 70 years or older, have owned and occupied the property for five years and lived in Massachusetts for the preceding 10 years.

Applications must be filed annually with the local Assessor's Office and are due within 3 months after the mailing of the actual tax bills.

WHAT IS LYME DISEASE?

We live in an area that has a high incidence of Lyme disease and other tick-borne illnesses, especially during the spring/summer and early fall. Lyme disease is an illness caused by bacteria (germ)



that is spread by the bite of a tiny, infected deer ticks. The tick usually must be attached to a person for at least 24 hours be-

fore it can spread the germ. Deer ticks are capable of spreading more than one type of germ in a single bite. Some of these other germs include: Babesiosis and Anaplasmosis.

Symptoms of Lyme disease usually begin to appear anywhere

from 3 to 30 days after a tick bite. Often times, a person cannot recall having a



tick on them or being bitten.
Symptoms may include a bulls-eye rash, flu like symptoms, muscle/joint aches, and could progress to affecting the nervous system and heart problems if not identified and treated.

Prompt treatment with antibiotics during the early stage of the disease prevents later, more serious problems. Always talk with your doctor about your symptoms and treatment. It's a good idea to let your doctor know when you remove a tick from your body for your health records and as a reference should you develop any symptoms.

Prevention is the key! Use a repellent with DEET or Permethrin according to instructions given on the product label. Wear long, light-colored pants tucked into your socks or boots. Stay on cleared trails when walking and avoid tall grasses and leaf piles if possible. Talk to your vet about your pet. Most important—

check yourself children and pets for ticks after being outdoors and if found, remove promptly! The best way to remove a tick is to first-wash your hands and the site with mild soap & water, next use tweezers or a tick remover to gently pull the tick straight out with steady, straight pull. If some of the tick remains under the skin, do NOT dig at the area. Consider it like a splinter; it will work its way out. Keep the site clean, dry and monitor for any signs of infection or rash, etc. and notify your health care provider. A detailed notice of the schedule is posted on CMMP (www.CMMCP.org) and on phone system (508-393-3055) after 3:30 pm. The program will shut down after cool temperatures become predominant in the area.

Complaints can be registered at 508-393-3055 between 7 am and 3:30 pm. Requests for no spray must be made in writing.

TRANSFER STATION FY2017 STICKER RENEWAL BEGINS JULY 1ST

The FY2017 Transfer Station stickers can be purchased at the Town Offices or by using the Online Payment Center link beginning July 1st. Starting this year, if you have previously purchased a sticker and live at the same address, you can pre-order a sticker using the Renewal by Mail Forms. The forms can be picked up at the Transfer Station, the Library, 19 Carter or downloaded from the Board of Health web site at

http://www.townofberlin.com/boards-andcommittees/board-of-health/.

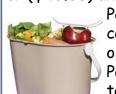
TRANSFER STATION STICKER FEES

1st sticker for Household \$115, \$140 if purchased after August 15th 2nd sticker for Household \$15 with a limit of 3 stickers per household. Senior Fee (70 and over) \$70. \$90 if purchased after August 15th.

Hardship Fee (as per Assessors List) \$70. The Board of Health website lists transfer stations hours, lists of items that are accepted, as well as, those that are not.

ARE YOU TURNING 65?

Even if you're working and covered by medical insurance, you will want to apply for Medicare at least 3 months before turning 65 or there will be penalties.

When applying for Medicare, you can sign up for Part A (hospital insurance) and Part B (medical insurance). Because you pay a premium for Part B coverage, you can turn it down. However, if you decide to enroll in Part B later on, you may have to pay a late enrollment penalty for as long as you have Part B coverage. Your monthly premium will go up 10 percent for each 12-month period you were eligible for Part B, but didn't sign up for it, unless you qualify for a special enrollment period.
