April 12<sup>th</sup> is the last day to register to vote at the Annual Town Meeting or Election. You have until 8pm to register at the Town Clerk's Office or online.

### **DOG LICENSES**

All dog licenses expire on March 31<sup>st</sup>. Tags are available by sending a stamped, selfaddressed envelope to the Town Clerk's Office or stopping by during office hours. Intact males and females are \$11.00. Neutered and spayed dogs are \$7.00. A current rabies certificate must be kept on file. Checks can made payable to 'Town of Berlin'. Credit cards are accepted through TownofBerlin.com. All dogs over 6 months must be licensed.

Fines will be imposed after June 1st for unlicensed dogs.

### **COMMUNITY GARDEN**

Now is the time to start looking through the seed catalogs to plan this year's vegetable garden. The Agricultural Commission is making preparations for the planting season at the Community Garden on River Road. The Garden offers Berlin residents the opportunity to grow their own organic vegetables. The gardens are tilled in the spring and divided into plots -  $30 - 20' \times 20'$  and  $15 - 10' \times 10'$ , as well as, 2 raised beds,  $4' \times 8'$ , for anyone with a disability.


A locked shed serves the purpose of storing garden tools and two 550-gallon tanks provide water for irrigation. Cured and processed organic compost is available on site. In addition, gardeners can bring in organic manure. Wood chips from brush cut and chipped by the DPW can be used for mulch and making garden paths. A canopy and a picnic table on the back side of the shed provide an ideal place to take a break and get out of the hot sun for a little while. There is also a 'handy' house on site.

Applications for the Community Garden were sent out in January with the Annual Census. They are also available at the Town Clerk's office. Applications are being accepted for the plots no later than May 15 and preferably by April 1<sup>-</sup> Donations start at \$15.00 for the larger and \$10.00 for the smaller plots and also the raised beds. Unless space permits, plots are limited to one per family. Seniors over 65 are eligible for reduced rates for the plots. Berlin students at Tahanto and Assabet and Berlin Food Pantry clients can apply for plots for free.

A Kick-Off Meeting is scheduled for April 12, at 7pm, in the Town Offices on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor, the last room on the left at the Town Offices. Gardeners from previous years have the 1<sup>st</sup> choice of garden space. Remaining plots will be assigned by lottery. Rules and regulations (posted on the TownofBerlin.com website under the Community tab) will be discussed at the Kick-Off Meeting.

There are still lots of spaces available for anyone who wants to grow their own fresh vegetables. It's a great opportunity for first timers to learn from more experienced gardeners in this community-friendly environment or anyone who simply wants to provide good organic food for their family.

### **OPEN SPACE UPDATE BY WALTER BICKFORD**

The Conservation Commission purchased an additional 49 acres of land in 2015.

### Total acres protected acres in Berlin

Owner and type of protection A	cres
Berlin fee-owned	954.3

Of the 954.3 acres, Berlin tax payers only spent \$11,000 for 229.3 acres before 1996. The remaining 725 acres protected post 1996 with mitigation monies from Solomon Pond Mall at an average price of \$4,138 per acre. Note that a couple of high ticket parcels like the fifteen acres at the corner of Pleasant and Central Streets cost \$500,000 really inflated the average price paid per acre. Bottom line is that Berlin property tax payers have spent the unbelievable low price of \$11,000 to protect 954.3 acres.

The Conservation Commission has recently committed to protecting a 55 acre farm and 73 acres of woodland (East face of Mt. Pisgah). SVT has committed to protect another 60 acres elsewhere.

At this time Commission's Land Acquisition Fund is depleted. The Commission will be asking the Town Meeting in May to restore the Fund by raising three million dollars. Immediate targets for this funding will be three farms, and additional woodlands that will link together existing protected areas. Such greenway linkages are critical for wildlife movement as well as recreational trail networks. These projects should result in the protection of the most critical open spaces on Berlin.

Two other projects that the CC is planning are: first a handicapped accessible trail from the parking area at Berlin Meadows, down a ramp, and across the meadow to a picnic area in the woods on the far side. Second, we are asking approval of the Town Meeting to develop a rail trail along the old Central Mass Railroad. Both will enable seniors, people with children or mobility problems to enjoy fresh air, beauty and exercise without fear of rough terrain or vehicular traffic.
