New Rules for Burning Permits

Burning season runs from January 15 to May 1st. This year the procedure to obtain permits has changed. Permits are no longer available at Town Offices. They can be requested online at http://massfire.net/brush/ berlin.php between the hours of 9:30am and 12:00pm for a cost of \$10. Payment for the permit can be made using a debit card or echeck with your bank routing number and account number. Authorization to burn can be requested through the website. If burning is permitted that day, you will be able to enter your permit number and authorization code to be placed on the burning list for that day only. A message will be displayed on the website if burning is not permitted due to weather conditions. Burning hours are from 10am to 4pm with fires out by 4pm.

AVOIDING SCAMS: TIPS FOR ELDERS

Never give out personal information over the telephone such as Social Security Number, date-of-birth, credit card number, bank account number or Medicare number, if you have not initiated the call.

Do not give out personal information in person (many scam artists target the elderly at home by going door-to-door) if you have not scheduled an appointment with the caller.

Only give out personal information over the telephone if you have initiated the call to make a purchase or a charitable donation.

Never give in to pressure tactics from a caller. A legitimate business or charitable organization will not pressure you into making a purchase or giving a donation.

Remember, if you feel pressured or suspicious of the caller, you can always hang up!

Remember, you can request the caller to give you their telephone number and you can make the call yourself before giving out personal information. A tactic of the Drug Discount Card Scam is to give the elder person a telephone number that is disconnected.

Elders who encounter benefits related scams should report their suspicions to the Executive Office of Elder Affairs by calling 1-800-243-4636 and pressing 3; their local police; the MA Attorney General's office, and to Prescription Advantage at 1-800-AGE-INFO. Medicare related scams should be reported to Medicare at 1-800-MEDICARE.

THE FIVE STEPS TO TAKE IF YOUR CREDIT CARD/WALLET IS STOLEN

Step 1. This something you should do now: Make photocopies (front and back) of all your credit cards, ID cards and licenses in your wallet. List your account numbers and the toll free phone numbers you'd need to call to report them missing. Keep this photocopy in a separate, safe place.

Step 2. Call the companies that issued your credit cards to report the theft. Do this as soon as you discover the problem. Use the toll free number; most companies are available 24 hours a day to deal with these emergencies. Write down the name of each person you speak with. It's a good idea to follow up each of your phone calls with a letter. Summarize your phone conversation, including your name, account number, when you noticed that your card was missing, the date you first reported the loss via phone, and the name of the person you spoke with.

Step 3. Call the three national credit-reporting agencies (Equifax, Experian, and Trans Union) to report the theft, and ask them to attach a fraud alert to all your credit cards.

Step 4. If your social security card is missing, call the Social Security Administration (fraud line) at 800.269.0271. Also, call the Motor Vehicles Bureau about your driver's license, as well as any other organizations from which you lost cards.

Step 5. Call the police in the jurisdiction where your credit cards were stolen to report the theft.

BE ALERT TO TAX SCAMS

In recent years, thousands of people have lost money and had their personal information compromised due to tax scams and fake IRS communications.

THE IRS WILL NEVER:

-Call to demand immediate payment using a specific payment method such as a prepaid debit card, gift card or wire transfer. Generally, the IRS will first mail you a bill if you owe any taxes.

- Threaten to immediately bring in local police or other law-enforcement groups to have you arrested for not paying.

-Demand you pay taxes without giving you the opportunity to question or appeal the amount they say you owe. -Ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone.

The IRS does not initiate contact with taxpayers by email, text messages or social media to request personal or financial information. The IRS does not threaten taxpayers with lawsuits, imprisonment or other enforcement action.

Don't' fall victim to scams. Medicare, the IRS, Social Security or any Government agency will never call you requesting this information. They will only notify you by U.S. Postal mail. Thank you!
