"THERE'S NO PLACE LIKE HOME" -- AND THE MASS REHAB COMMISSION CAN HELP!

Please know that you (as a homeowner) may be in a position to improve safety in your home through a zero interest loan through the Massachusetts RehabCommsion. There are no age requirements.

The Home Modification Loan Program offered by the Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission (MRC) offers 0% and 3% loans (up to \$30,000) to help Massachusetts homeowners make modifications to stay at home. Loans can help finance projects such as:

- -Ramps;
- -Stair lifts and wheelchair lifts; -Kitchen and bathroom adaptations:
- -Home security... hard-wired alarm systems, safety windows, and fences;

With generous income guidelines, approximately 95% of borrowers qualify for a 0% loan with no monthly payments. Repayment is required when the home is sold or transferred.

THE SEASON OF THE TICKS

Once again, be on the lookout for those nasty ticks that are especially active during the spring/summer and early fall. Lyme disease is caused by bacteria that is spread by the bite of an infected deer tick. The tick usually must be attached to a person for at least 24 hours before it can spread the germ. Deer ticks are capable of spreading more than one type of germ in a single bite; such as, Babesiosis and Anaplasmosis.

Take a few extra moments to check your clothes and animals after being outdoors. Prevention is the key! Use a repellent with DEET or Permethrin according to instructions given on the product label. Wear long pants and light colored clothing that will help to show the ticks.

- Full Flower Moon May In most areas, flowers are abundant everywhere during this time. Thus, the name of this Moon. Other names include the Full Corn Planting Moon, or the Milk Moon.
- Full Strawberry Moon June This name was universal to every Algonquin tribe. However, in Europe they called it the Rose Moon. Also because the relatively short season for harvesting strawberries comes each year during the month of June . . . so the full Moon that occurs during that month was christened for the strawberry!

VETERANS' BENEFITS

Veterans' Agent, Jim Cabral is available to speak with veterans seeking information about their benefits. He is able to assist veterans in filing claims. This may be especially important to seniors who are showing the effects of Agent Orange exposure during the Viet Nam era. There are 12-15 presumptive illnesses attributed to Agent Orange, one of them being prostate cancer. According to Jim, we are lucky to have some of the best VA healthcare services in this area.

A great source of information is found on the www.Mass.gov website and search on weterans benefits. Below are a few excerpts from the website with a few examples of benefits.

FINANCIAL MEDICAL & ASSISTANCE

Under Ch. 115 of Massachusetts General Laws, the Commonwealth provides a uniform program of financial and medical assistance for low-income veterans and their dependents. Qualifying veterans and their dependents receive necessary financial assistance for food, shelter, clothing, housing supplies, and medical care in accordance with a formula which takes into account the number of dependents and income from all sources.

PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS

Veterans and spouses where applicable may qualify for property tax exemptions under M.G.L. Ch. 59.

MEMORIAL DAY HISTORY

Three years after the Civil War ended, on May 5, 1868, the head of an organization of Union veterans — the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) — established Decoration Day as a time for the nation to decorate the graves of the war dead with flowers. Maj. Gen. John A. Logan declared that Decoration Day should be observed on May 30. It is believed that date was chosen because flowers would be in bloom all over the country.

The first large observance was held that year at Arlington National Cemetery, across the Potomac River from Washington, D.C.

The ceremonies centered around the mourning-draped veranda of the Arlington mansion, once the home of Gen. Robert E. Lee. Various Washington officials, including Gen. and Mrs. Ulysses S. Grant, presided over the ceremonies. After speeches, children from the Soldiers' and Sailors' Orphan Home and members of the GAR made their way through the cemetery, strewing flowers on both Union and Confederate graves, reciting prayers and sing-

AMERICAN LEGION ORIGINS

The American Legion, Inc. is an American veterans' organization formed in Paris, France on March 16, 1919, by members of the American Expeditionary Forces. The Legion was chartered by the United States Congress on September 16, 1919. It is headquartered in Indianapolis, Indiana and also legislative offices in Washington. The American Legion played the leading role in drafting and passing the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944, otherwise known as the "GI Bill".

Only those, who served at least 1 day during wartime and were honorably discharged, are eligible to be members of the Legion.

MEMORIAL DAY, MAY 29TH

In compliance with the General Orders of the headquarters Dept. of Mass G.A.R. the American Legion and its Auxiliary will decorate the graves of our fallen comrades. All Soldiers and Sailors, whether a member or not, are invited to be present and assist in the exercises of the day. The American Legion and its Auxiliary are represented by the H. Wallace Woodward Post No. 162 Dept. of Mass.

The parade forms at 12:45 at Berlin Memorial School with a tribute by Robert Rainville, Commander, a recitation of Flanders Fields by Chris Maki, prayers, the placing of wreaths, the singing of God Bless America by Chandler Walsh and a salute to the dead by the Legion Firing Squad followed by Taps.

The parade will reform and march to the Old Burial Ground with another recitation of Flanders Field. The Gettysburg Address will be presented by Keevan Regan, the Edward "Squash" Bartlett Award by the Bartlett Family, and the singing of National Anthem by Chandler Walsh. This year's speaker is Tracy Lynch, in charge of the JRROTC at Assabet Valley Regional High School, followed by a prayer, a Salute to the Dead and Taps. It is up to us, the living, to not forget their sacrifice.

For people with Medicare, MOON has a new meaning: "Medicare Outpatient Observation Notice". This newly required notice must be given to some papitals are increasingly admitting patients under observation status.

You may be surprised to know that even if you are admitted to a hospital room overnight, you might not be an "inpatient". If you are under observation, you are considered an outpatient even though you may stay in a hospital bed for many days. This changes how your Medicare coverage works. The MOON will explain the reason for observation status and how it affects your Medicare

For example, if you have Original Medicare, with or without a Medigap plan, an inpatient hospital stay of at least three days is needed to get any coverage for skilled nursing facility (SNF) care. If you are under observation, you would not get any follow up SNF coverage paid for, even if it is medically necessary. However, if you are in a Medicare Advantage plan or your doctor is in an Accountable Care Organization, the rules are different and the three-day requirement may be waived.
