THE JAPANESE LOVER BY ISABEL ALLENDE

The world known author Isabel Allende, has written a fascinating love story, set in San Francisco and covering the 70 year period from 1939, the beginning of the World War to the near present. Her skill is in the weaving of the characters' stories with the times, the sorrows, the passion and the mysteries that many lives can relate to.

The main character, Alma Mendel, age 7 is sent by her parents from Poland to Aunt Lillian and Uncle Isaac Belasco in San Francisco just as they had sent Alma's brothers to England as war loomed and Hitler's persecution of the Jews grew. At first Alma is very homesick but finds friendship in Nathanial, Isaac's son who is several years older, but kind, and in Ichimei Fakuda, the youngest son of the gardener, and the same age as Alma.

Irina is an aide at Lark House, a nursing home in San Francisco who seems to have a secret in her background. She soon becomes a personal aide to Alma after Alma arrives very suddenly one day in a chauffeured car, with a simple wardrobe, a small Smart car, and a lifelong background as an internationally known textile artist. Why would this active woman in her early seventies choose to come to Lark House when she had a comfortable life in the Belasco family mansion?

Alma lives in the "independent

But once a month she receives a letter and the gift of a gardenia, after which she packs a small weekend bag with her best clothes and disappears for a few days, and returns very happy. Where does she go?

Seth, Alma's grandson, is fascinated by his grandmother, and decides that her sudden change to Lark House is because of mysterious happenings in her life. He convinces Irina to help him find out more about his grandmother's life with the ruse of Alma helping him write a historical saga of not just the Belasco's but of San Francisco.

The author skillfully ties together the various threads of the lives of her characters and leaves the reader with a sense of a mystery solved and an appreciation of the many kinds of love and sacrifice we may be capable of.

BREAKFAST IN A MUG

These recipes are great for a quick and easy breakfast or snack when you don't feel like spending a lot of time in the kitchen. All you need is a mug, add the ingredients, mix and microwave for 1 minute. **Note** that times may vary depending on your microwave.

> <u>Blueberry Muffin</u> 4 TBS flour

2 TBS sugar 2 TBS sugar 1/8 tsp baking soda 3 TBS milk 1 TBS vegetable oil Pinch of salt Mix all ingredients in a mug Add blueberries and stir Sprinkle brown sugar on top Microwave for 1 minute

<u>Omelet in a Mug</u> 2 eggs 2 TBS milk Chopped onions Pinch of Cheese Salt and pepper to taste Mix all ingredients in a mug Microwave for 1 minute Top with diced tomatoes, onions and parsley, if desired

1/2 banana, mashed 2 TBS milk 1/4 tsp baking powder 1-1/2 TBS brown sugar 1/4 tsp vanilla 3/4 tsp cinnamon 5 TBS flour 1 TBS vegetable oil Microwave for 1 minute

WACHUSETT DAM WALKWAY

The walkway across the top of the Dam will be open for enjoying the view of the Reservoir. DCR Rangers will answer questions about the Reservoir's history and the importance of watershed protection. Come learn about the Division of Water Supply Protection's role in ensuring that the reservoir is a pristine drinking water source.

The walkway along the top of the majestic Wachusett Dam has been closed since the 1990s due to water supply security. DCR Watershed staff will be on hand to answer questions and to pro- vide information on DCR's watershed protection program.

Due to increased security, backpacks, briefcases, and other large bags will not be allowed at this event. All other items brought to the event may be subject to search.
