SCAMMERS TARGETING SENIORS

Senior citizens are often the targets of criminal activity, particularly identity theft and scams. Seniors can be targeted by telephone, through the mail, door-to-door or over the Internet. Remember, if it sounds too good to be true, then it probably is. These criminals try to play on your good will and trust. They will try to fast talk you or trick you by representing themselves as a government agency or a bank wanting to verify information.

Scams can vary but the objective is the same, to trick the victim into giving the thief money or access to bank accounts. It can be done any number of ways and the perpetrators are very skilled. They may make you think someone you know is in trouble and needs money wired to them or that you have won a prize but you must first pay a tax or a fee. While the particulars are different, there are common tips to protect yourself.

Remember a legitimate business or government agency will NEVER call or email you asking you to verify account information, PIN numbers, social security or credit card numbers.

If they won't put it in writing, don't do business with them.

Ask questions.

Don't feel pressured to "act now" Don't pay by cash or wire money. Don't be afraid to hang up or

Don't be atraid to hang up or close the door.

If you receive a letter or phone call or e-mail notifying you that you have won some kind of prize, be careful! This is most likely a scam.

Check references.

When contracting work, get a written contract that is signed and includes total price, a detailed de-

WATER... IT'S GOOD FOR YOU!!!!

Water helps your body function by:

- Keeping your body temperature normal;
- Lubricating & cushioning joints;
- Protecting & cushioning your vital organs;
- Helping you absorb nutrients;
- Carrying nutrients & oxygen to your cells;
- Moistens oxygen for breathing;
- Removing waste (urination, respiration and elimination).

Your body needs more water when you are:

- In hot weather; Running a fever;
- Having diarrhea or vomiting;
- Physically active.

If adequate water is not consumed on a daily basis, the body fluids will be out of balance, causing dehydration.

Best sources of water are:

- Drinking water (tap or bottle);
- Soup; milk; low sugar juices;
- Jell-O; Popsicles;
- Oranges, melons, tomatoes.

Where is all that water?

The human body is made up of 72% water.

- Lungs: 90% water; Blood: 82%;
- Skin: 80%; Muscles: 75%;
- Brain: 70%; Bones: 22%.

Some people have fluid restrictions because of a health problem. If your healthcare provider has told you to restrict your fluid intake, be sure to follow that advice.

A GENTLEMAN IN MOSCOW BY AMOR TOWLES It is 1922 when 30 year old Alexander Ilyich Rostov is called before the Committee of the People's Commissariat for Internal Affairs in Moscow. The expectation is that as an unrepentant aristocrat he should be put against the wall and shot. However, some in the senior ranks of the Party plead his case and he is instead sentenced to house arrest at the Hotel Metropol where the Count has a suite. If he is to ever to set foot outside the Metropol, he will be shot. Count Rostov had been raised by his godfather, the Grand Duke Demidov after the untimely death of both his parents. The Grand Duke, raised and educated Ilyich and his sister, Helena, in the aristocratic tradition. One of his first words of wisdom for the young Rostov was "that adversity presents itself in many forms; and that if a man does not master his circumstances then he is bound to be mastered by them." The Count soon realizes the worth of this advice. Written from the point of view of the Count, the reader is treated to masterful language of the cultured class of the times. Characters are developed and scene after scene is delightfully drawn. The Count forges friendships with other long term members of the grand hotel. There is no lack of humor as characters and the droll Count interact. Unlikely alliances are made and Count Rostov develops a character rich in emotional maturity and wit but is almost undone when circumstances suddenly puts the life of a six year old girl in his hands. The story line never falters as the Metropol is the one place in the changing city that all manner of characters flow through. The world beyond the doors of the hotel affects the lives of those within as the young Bolshevik revolution gradually leads to the time of Stalin and finally even the Metropol is not immune to the cruelty of the tumultuous times in which the story is set.

VETERANS' STATISTICS

Did You Know?

In WWII, there were 86,940 Marine causalities in 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ years. In Vietnam there were 103,324 Marine casualties in 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ years.

Did you know?

In WWII, the average Marine saw 40 days of front line fighting in 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ years. Using the same criteria in Vietnam the average Marine saw 240 days of front line fighting in 1 years. 24 times the exposure.

Did you know?

Marines comprised 20% of the troops that served in Vietnam and have 26% of the names on The Wall.

Did you know?

28% of all Marines that served in Vietnam would be killed or wounded. Including all support troops. So if you were in the bush it would be closer to 50 or 60%.

- Full Beaver Moon Nov. 4th This was the time to set beaver traps before the swamps froze, to ensure a supply of warm winter furs. Another interpretation suggests that the name Full Beaver Moon comes from the fact that the beavers are now actively preparing for winter. It is sometimes also referred to as the Frosty Moon.
- The Full Cold Moon; or the Full Long Nights Moon Dec. 3rd During this month the winter cold fastens its grip, and nights are at their longest and darkest. It is also sometimes called the Moon before Yule. The term Long Night Moon is a doubly appropriate name because the midwinter night is indeed long, and because the Moon is above the horizon for a long time. The midwinter full Moon has a high trajectory across the sky because it is opposite a low Sun.

The winter solstice is the "shortest day" of the year, with the least amount of sunlight. The Sun reaches its most southern point in the sky at local noon. After this date, the days start getting "longer".

IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR SENIORS

You're getting a new Medicare card! Cards will be mailed between April 2018 – April 2019

You asked, and we listened. You're getting a new Medicare card! Between April 2018 and April 2019, we'll be removing Social Security numbers from Medicare cards and mailing each person a new card. This will help keep your information more secure and help protect your identity. You'll get a new Medicare Number that's unique to you, and it will only be used for your Medicare coverage. The new card won't change your coverage or benefits. You'll get more information from Medicare when your new card is mailed.

Here's how you can get ready:

- Make sure your mailing address is up to date. If your address needs to be corrected, contact Social Security at <u>ssa.gov/my</u> <u>account</u> or 1-800-772-1213. TTY users can call 1-800-325-0778
- Beware of anyone who contacts you about your new Medicare card. We'll never ask you to give us personal or private information to get your new Medicare Number and card. time than your friend's or neighbor's.
- Understand that mailing everyone a new card will take some time. Your card might arrive at a different time than your friend's or neighbor's.
