COMMUNITY LEGAL AID

Community Legal Aid provides free civil legal assistance to low-income and elderly families and individuals in central and western Mass. Their advocates have expertise in legal issues affecting elders. They can provide representation in courts and before administrative agencies with regard to a variety of legal matters, such as, domestic violence, and denial of Medicare benefits to name a few. They can prepare legal documents, including health care proxies, powers of attorney and homestead declarations.

There are no financial guidelines for services to individuals 60 or over; however, they do target services to the most vulnerable elders who are in social and/or economic need. Elders should call if: Denied government benefits such as SSI or Social Security; Benefits have been reduced or terminated; Electricity or gas has been, or will be, shut off; problems with Medicare, MassHealth or access to health care; concerns with nursing homes or rest homes; have housing problems or being evicted; victims of abuse or exploitation; or other legal problems. FOOD PANTRY

The Berlin Food Pantry serves 24 families for a total of 90 people per month. The Pantry can use donations of food, cleaning supplies and paper goods. Donations can be made at the Post Office, Town Offices, Recycle Center at the Transfer Station and Market Basket. Keep your receipts because donations are tax deductible.

YOUR BUS AWAITS YOU!

The senior bus was purchased for the convenience of Berlin's senior citizens to use for taking trips to the grocery store, like Market Basket or Wegman's or for rides to appointments, medical or otherwise. The bus can also be used for rides to 19 Carter for soup on Tuesdays and Friday, coffee on Wednesday mornings, tea on Thursday and even to the Flyleaf's Sunday matinee at the 1870 Town Hall.

To schedule a ride, simply call 978-838-2570 the day before you want a ride. You'll be given a call back to set up a pick up time. If it's your first time, you'll need to fill out a "Berlin Council on Aging Rider Information" form prior to riding on the bus.

The bus is here for you. It can give those who are not able or do not like to drive the chance of mobility to run errands and an opportunity to socialize.

PULLING PERMITS - THINGS TO CON-

SIDER WHEN BUILDING OR REMODELING

The building inspector is the person to contact for pulling a permit if you're reroofing, residing your home, new construction or demolishing existing structures, to name a few examples. Plumbing permits require a licensed plumber. Gas permits require a licensed plumber or a gas fitter. Most electrical permits need to pulled by licensed electrician. Some permits, such as fire alarm systems, installation of larger propane tanks and renting dumpster, have to be pulled with the Fire Department. The inspector or clerk would be able to let you know what type of permit or authorization from other town boards is needed.

Each city or town has its own set of building and zoning codes enforced by the inspectors. This requires the inspectors to take continuous education classes to keep abreast of codes at both the State and Town levels to insure work meets these standards.

Building Inspector responsibilities include handling code and plan reviews, zoning and land use issues and inspections mandated by law at various stages of the project before signing off on the work. While it does not happen very often, work that doesn't meet code or is unpermitted may be required to be removed and reworked. Problems resulting from work that has not been properly inspected could mean loss of insurance benefits.

Permit applications can be filled out on line or with the clerk at the Inspectors' Office in the Town Offices. Window hours are Monday thru Friday from 10-12. Any questions can be addressed by calling the office at 978-838-0046.

BERLIN CULTURAL COUNCIL BRINGING GREAT PROGRAMING <u>TO YOU</u>

The Berlin Cultural Council(BCC) supports community-based projects in the arts, humanities, and sciences. The programs promote the availability of rich cultural experiences for all ages in our community and is funded through the Massachusetts Cultural Council and the town of Berlin.

Through the application process in 2015, the BCC provided funding for many programs in town this year. Several music programs were supported including the Symphony Pro Musica's summer concert and the Assabet Valley Mastersingers who offer free tickets to senior citizens and a program by David Polansky called "Music through the Decades". Two events just for the senior citizens were also funded by the BCC, Tommy Rule presented "A Musical Journey Through the Years" and Alison O'Leary is presenting "Hidden Gems of New England" in early September. Berlin public library events include Ed the Wizard "Reading is Magic", an art workshop for everyone called "Pastel Painting Stunning Stilllifes Like the Masters" and a presentation by storyteller Mary Jo Miaichack. called "This-A-Way Mezudio".

The BCC works to provide and maintain the vitality of local cultural resources and to insure these are shared within the Berlin Community. At the BCC, we begin preparing for the grant cycle long before any applications are reviewed by gathering input from the community. Many of you participated in our recent survey which helps us respond to the needs of Berlin.

The Berlin Cultural Council will begin accepting applications September 1 for the next grant cycle. All applications must be received by Monday, October 17, 2016. It is a small window but a wonderful opportunity for groups, organizations, individuals and artists to apply for funding for their special programs. Detailed information and the online application is available on the Massachusetts Cultural Council (MCC) website.

The Berlin Cultural Council relies on volunteers to provide funding for these wonderful programs for our community. A volunteer in a town committee serves a 3 year term and unfortunately most of our current council member's term is ending soon. Without volunteers we will lose our local chapter and the funding for these great experiences for our community.. If you are interested in serving a term as a cultural council member please contact the BCC and fill out an application to be a volunteer with the town selectmen's office. ASIAN LONGHORNED BEETLES

You may have noticed the Asian long horned beetle traps on Barnes Hill Rd. and Linden St. The traps only attract the beetles if they are already in the area.

The Asian long horned beetle (ALB) is an invasive wood-boring



insect that attacks hardwood trees, including maple, birch and elm. A large infestation of ALB

was discovered in Worcester, MA in August 2008 and is currently under eradication. A small infestation of just 6 trees was found in Boston in 2010.

The spread of ALB would cause negative impacts to the maple sugaring, nursery, tourism and forest product industries of Massachusetts, and would seriously threaten our state's forest, park and street trees. The Division of Crop and Pest Services, through the Cooperative Agricultural Pest Survey (CAPS) Program, provides public outreach and screening of potential Asian long horned beetle sightings in order to prevent the further spread of this invasive pest.

Anyone can contribute to stopping the spread of ALB in our state. Here are three suggestions for what you can do to help:

1. Take ten minutes and survey your own property for signs of both beetles.

2. Organize a talk and/or survey for a local group or organization in your area.

 Buy firewood only where you intend to burn it, and chip wood onsite following yard work or storm cleanup. Don't move wood long distances because you could be accidentally spreading pests.
