SHINE Counseling Services

Open Enrollment for the 2024 calendar year starts on October 15th. As Medicare recipients are aware, the open enrollment period allows people to pick new Medicare Advantage plans or enroll in a new Part D prescription drug plan. If you have Original Medicare (Medicare A and B), you do not need to pick an Advantage plan, but you can if you want to.

SHINE Counseling services are helpful to anyone who has questions regarding Medicare coverage, what is best for your situation and planning for retirement. There are time tables to register for Medicare services without penalty (for Parts B and D). The vast majority of people qualify for Medicare A without a penalty. I have recently completed SHINE training and am able to help out our residents.

We are having a presentation on Monday September 25th to discuss the basics of Medicare. Please reach out to us at 978-838-2750 if you have any questions.

Tax Abatements

If you think that you may qualify for any kind of tax abatement, please come to the Assessor's Office or call them at 978-838-2256. If you have any concerns about paying your taxes, please reach out as well. We want to make sure that all seniors have all the information possible. Abatements need to be filed before the next tax bill is due for you to be considered.

MassHealth Ongoing Recertification

As we mentioned in the last issue, MassHealth has started undergoing recertification of benefits. During the COVID-19 emergency, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts automatically continued coverage for those on MassHealth. Since the emergency status of COVID has lifted, MassHealth is now undertaking the task of reviewing its 2,000,000 applicants. We are asking you to please be on the lookout for any blue envelopes coming to you, this is a main way that seniors will be recertifying their eligibility. If you have had any change of address or contact information during COVID, please call update your records with MassHealth. The Five W's: Berlin's who, what, when, where, and why

ALL HANDS ON DECK AT THE BULLARD HOUSE — story by Lucy Ayers

You might be wondering what's happening at the Bullard House. There's a lot of activity going on — most of it not visible to the public. June Miller and Janet Woodward have been very busy researching and preparing for the writing of grant applications, which is not a simple task. There is information to gather, forms to fill out and deadlines to meet before going forward with restorations and repairs. Members of the Historical Commission have been meeting with Dan Barton of Maugel & Destefano Architects, Dan Wolfe of David E. Ross Associates, Inc., Tom Lamb of TFMoran Structural Engineers and Kristen Rubin our Town Administrator to provide a comprehensive plan with the end goal of solving accessible parking, access to the Bullard House and 1870 Town Hall, as well as drainage issues for the area.

Barry Eager has been documenting and selecting artifacts to digitize for online access on our website. Ellie Bergen is the representative for the Community Preservation Act Committee, whose job is to make recommendations for Town Meetings for how to distribute CPAC funds. Janet and Lucy have contributed to website blogs and programs to keep you informed of our progress.

Members of the Historical Commission and Historical Society have been working to maintain the lawn and flower beds at the Bullard House. Progress has been slowed down by all the recent rainstorms. We were able to catch up on some weeding and mowing on August 3rd with the help of Historical Society volunteers Barbara Payan, Nancy Mulcahy, Bonnie Fallon and Historical Commission members June Miller and Lucy Ayers. The grounds look much better but there's still more to do. The Highway Department later picked up and disposed of the debris.

Marty Miller, a member of the Historical Society, sanded the recently replaced, front-door threshold, and June applied linseed oil to protect the wood. June claims that with proper care the threshold will last longer than most of us reading this. Cordelia's Farm donated flowers for the flowerpot on the front doorstep. Our resident woodchuck occasionally supplements his/her diet by munching on the flowers.

Berlin History Maker: Mary Petkauskas

People on the verge of retiring from careers that consumed a large portion of their waking hours are sometimes heard to rhapsodize about how they look forward to leaving the alarm clock in a drawer and pursuing matters of interest they never had time for while working. This appears not to have been a vision in the game plan of Mary Petkauskas.

Mary retired to an apartment in Berlin's Northbrook Village I, from which she applied the lessons learned in her 40 years of work as a nurse to continuing her lifelong interest in helping the elderly and frail to find the services needed to survive and thrive in their senior years.

An article in the November/December 2001 edition of the "Powderhouse Senior News" noted that "Over the 40 years of Ms. Petrauskas" active nursing career, she witnessed a gradual rise in esteem for registered nurses. She began as a conventional nurse and later rose, after obtaining

advanced degrees, to the role of college teacher and research participant. (She) contributed articles to several professional nursing journals during her nursing career."

As a retiree in Berlin, Mary became very involved in nutritional and other support programs for seniors. She helped launch the Berlin Meals on Wheels program, created the "Powderhouse Senior News" and initiated a transportation program for the town's senior citizens.

In recognition of her dedicated years of volunteer service, Mary Petkauskas was one of a select few presented with the Silver Dove Award by then-governor William Weld in 1995. She received several additional awards related to her years of work for Berlin's elderly population.

You would be correct in thinking that the town and its seniors were the biggest winners when Mary Petkauskas' number came up for the opportunity to occupy an apartment in Northbrook Village I.

SNAP and HIP — Holiday Farms Presentation

In early August, we were lucky enough to get Suzanna Roberts from Holiday Farms to town offices to discuss SNAP and HIP benefits.

For those who may not be aware, the Healthy Incentives Program (HIP) is a benefit that approved farm stands and farmer's markets can provide. If you have a SNAP/EBT card, you are already enrolled in the HIP program. HIP allows for people to get free fruits and vegetables as long as they have SNAP benefits in place. Anyone can apply for SNAP benefits—monthly income and household size are the main determining factors for the program.

HIP benefits allow fresh whole, cut, canned or frozen fruits and vegetables as well as seedlings and spice plants. Although HIP cannot be used for honey, seniors can use their MFM coupons to purchase honey. Any canned produce that have added sugar or vinegar do not qualify for the HIP program reimbursement.

This not-well-known program can provide \$40 a month for household of 1-2 people, \$50 a month for households of 3-4 people and \$60 a month for households of 5+ people. HIP benefits reset at the first of each month. For HIP to work, you must maintain a small balance on your SNAP/EBT

(even as low as a few dollars). This will allow the farmstand to swipe your card to utilize your HIP benefit but it WILL NOT impact your SNAP balance. If you do get farmer's market coupons, you can use them in tandem with HIP benefits.

HIP benefits are automatic for those who have SNAP/ EBT card. HIP can ONLY be used at farmer's markets or farmstands, they cannot be used at a grocery store. Once approved farmstands and farmer's markets close for the season, you cannot use the benefit again they reopen. You cannot have HIP benefits rollover month to month and there are no refunds.

Holiday Farm is the lone HIP provider in Berlin but there are several other farmstands around that do accept HIP benefits. Holiday Farm will be open this season until December 16th. Holiday Farm also accepts MFM coupons. You can find a list of HIP and SNAP providers at dtafinder. dtadash.ehs.mass.gov. If you have any questions about SNAP or HIP benefits, you can call 800-997-2555. To apply for SNAP you can call 877-382-2363 (ext 7) or you can go online at https://www.mass.gov/how-to/apply-for-snap-benefits-food-stamps.

Town Greeter— Work Off/Volunteer Position

The Town Offices has been getting an increase of visitors on a daily basis. With this increased traffic, staff have been more challenged trying to directly connect with each visitor. That being said, the Town Administrator and Select Board want to try and get a town greeter to help each visitor get their services rendered more efficiently.

Town Greeters would be eligible for senior tax work off credits as long as they meet criteria. The hope is to have multiple greeters be available to help out during the week (Monday-Friday). If you are interested, please see the Town of Berlin website for information or collect an application/job description at the town offices.

Flu Clinic and COVID tests

We are awaiting more information from Nashoba Boards of Health regarding the annual flu clinic at Berlin Memorial School. The flu clinic will likely be in mid-October.

September is Suicide Prevention Month.

Mental Health in Older Adults: The CDC estimates 20% of people aged 55 years or older experience some type of mental health concern. The most common conditions include anxiety, severe cognitive impairment, and mood disorders (such as depression or bipolar disorder). Mental health issues are often implicated as a factor in cases of emotional distress and suicide. Older men have the highest suicide rate of any age group with men aged 85 years or older having a suicide rate of 45.23 per 100,000 compared to an overall rate of 11.01 per 100,000.

Depression in Older Adults: The CDC and National Institute on Aging recognize depression as the most prevalent mental health problem among older adults. Depression is mood disorder that impacts the way an individual feels, acts, and thinks. The prevalence of depression has been increasing during the COVID-19 pandemic, making it important to recognize signs and symptoms so treatment can be obtained when it is needed. At its worst, depression can cause a mental health crisis including thoughts of self-harm and suicide. Suicide and Crisis Lifeline: 988 is a free 3-digit phone number that any individual who is in need of support for a suicidal, mental health, and/or substance use crisis or any other type of emotional distress can utilize. Individuals can also utilize 988 if they have concerns regarding someone else's wellbeing. Trained crisis counselors respond to all 988 calls/texts.

The following is a list of ways to support a loved one with depression.

- Encourage the person to seek medical treatment and stick with the prescribed treatment plan.
- Help set up medical appointments or accompany the person to the appointments.
- Participate in activities the person likes to do.
- Ask if the person wants to go for a walk or other form of exercise
- If you have an immediate concern regarding a loved one's mental health, call 988.

Debt Collections and Older Adults

At the end of June, there was a presentation given out by the Greater Boston Legal Services to discuss the debt collection process and how it directly impacts older adults.

According to the GBLS, 1 in 4 people have debt that is in collection and this industry makes about 11 billion dollars in revenue annually. Non-mortagaged debt is approximately 16.9 billion dollars. Older Americans are dealing with a chunk though younger people carry most of this debt. Massachusetts has a high rate of economically insecure older adults and many are struggling financially. About 41 percent of Mass. households have credit card debt.

Unfortunately, 1 in 4 people have a debt that goes into collection and this industry makes 11 billion dollars in revenue each year. Debt collectors win approximately 95% of the time. Reasoning includes that debt collectors have resources to bring these cases to court. Most people do not have any legal representation (only 2% do).

If you get a debt that goes into collection, please reach out to them regarding payments. Debt collectors can only contact you two times per week (this includes calls, text messages, emails and mail) to try and collect money. It is advised that you attend any court hearing that is scheduled, even if you cannot pay off the debts.

There are restrictions regarding income and assets that can be used to repay a debt. Massachusetts has various resources that you can use if you are in need of help. Massachusetts Legal Resource Finder (masslrf.org) has a state wide list of lawyers for you to contact. There is also the Volunteer Lawyers Project (617-603-1700), the Attorney General's Consumer Advocacy and Response (617-727-8400) and the Office of Economic Empowerment (mass.gov/economic-empowerment-for-older-adults) available to use if needed.

BOB HOKANSON'S ORIGINAL APPLE PIE

- 1 Granny Smith apple
- 2 Braeburn apples
- 2 Macintosh apples
- 2/3 cups sugar
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon

Butter

Carefully layer the apples in the bottom of pie crust in the order given. Stir the sugar and cinnamon together and sprinkle over the apples. Dot the apples with butter. Place the top crust on the apples and seal the edges. Cut a smiley face on the top crust to vent.

Bake in a 400° oven for 1 hour or until done.

JOANNE HOKANSON'S OLIVE OIL PIE CRUST

2 cups flour

1 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup extra virgin olive oil

8 Tbsps. water

Combine the flour and salt. Stir in the olive oil and water. Roll out the dough between wax paper.
