Medicare Open Enrollment — October 15 to December 7 It is that time of year again. For those who have Medicare benefits or will have soon, this is for you. There are different types of Medicare including A (emergency care and SNF coverage), B (primary care services), D (prescription) and C (combination). With the August 7th Congress bill being passed, it aimed to help with Medicare prescription costs. Please call the COA at 978-838-2750 if you have any questions. Nashoba Neighbors Launches Pilot

"We're working out the kinks before we fully launch in 2023," says Nashoba Neighbors board member Susan Henry, of Berlin. Members of the newly-formed nonprofit have worked throughout the pandemic to design an all-volunteer support system for seniors in Berlin, Bolton, and Lancaster who want to age at home. Henry explained that, in preparation for a full launch in early 2023, Nashoba Neighbors has invited approximately 20 enthusiastic supporters to take the role of Member or Volunteer and to test the system this fall, from mid-September through December, 2022. This group will test the ways Nashoba Neighbors plans to address members' needs; the ways the organization will vet, train, and support community volunteers; and the way volunteers will be matched up with members' requests for assistance. "There is more to this than you'd think," says board member Mary Anne Cleary, adding that she is excited that residents across the three towns are engaged in the pilot, including Mark and Pat Smith (Berlin), Trudy Tervo (Berlin), Karen and George Davis (Lancaster), and still others from Bolton. Cleary adds, "We know they will bring great energy to our trial run and offer useful feedback so we can refine our approach and be fully ready to open for our area seniors in 2023."

"Our towns provide invaluable assistance to seniors through the Councils on Aging, food pantries, Friends of Seniors, and community centers," explains Henry, adding, "Nashoba Neighbors will focus on filling gaps in services that are necessary for seniors to remain independent while aging at home." The first is flexible, personalized transportation, available during a variety of hours — day, night, and weekends — and for a range of purposes, from medical appointments, errands, and trips to the post office to cultural events, tea with friends, and social gatherings. Second, volunteers from the three towns will help with tasks around the home that can become more difficult as people age. These may include putting away yard hoses for winter, cleaning out a closet, raking leaves from the deck or pathways, transplanting some favorite house plants, replacing light bulbs or smoke detector batteries, and many other tasks. TRUDY TERVO'S BANANA BREAD

1 cup shortening or butter

2 cups sugar

4 eggs

2 teaspoons vanilla

6 mashed bananas

3 1/2 cups flour

2 teaspoons baking soda

1/3 cup warm water

Cream shortening (or butter) and eggs (added one at a time) and mashed bananas and warm water. Add flour, baking soda and vanilla.

Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.

JANET WOODWARD'S APPLE BROWNIES

Janet says: "My sister, Marj, gave me this recipe and it is especially appreciated when you are in a pinch for time and company's coming."

1/2 cup butter or margarine

1 cup sugar

1 egg

1 cup flour

1/2 teaspoon baking powder

3 medium apples — about two cups of thin slices

1/2 teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon salt

Melt butter or margarine and add sugar and egg. Beat well. Mix in apples that are pared and thinly sliced. Sift flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, and cinnamon and stir into apple mixture. Spread in a 9" by 9" greased pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 to 50 minutes.

A half cup of nut meats may also be added to the batter, if desired. To make it fancier, add a dollop of whipped cream or ice cream on top.

The Bullard House has patiently waited for the opportunity to become our local history museum. Community Preservation Act funding has given us this opportunity by providing the means to plan wholistically... to envision a future for this building. The awarding of CPA funds has also given us the leverage to seek a Massachusetts Historical Commission MPPF grant and we will begin to integrate into our planning the steps needed to apply for that grant.

The Historical Commission is fortunate to have Architect Daniel Barton assist us in planning the work ahead for the Bullard House. Some of you may remember Dan as the person who conceptualized the elevator addition for the Berlin Town Hall, now known familiarly as the 1870. Dan also designed the addition that made our beautiful 19 Carter, the Old Methodist Episcopal Church, accessible.

Commission members started to work with Dan in May to write mission and vision statements, to assemble resources and collect the documentation that informs the work needed for creating a public space. At our upcoming meetings, we will begin prioritizing the steps to make this happen.
